




A Conversation with Dan Louth Arc Studio #205

When Dan Louth told me that these were the artists who inspired him, I went on a journey of discovery through his oil and acrylic works. Though unique in their own ways, I could see a freedom of style, a feeling





Sherri: Was there a turning point that lead to this shift in your careers? Do you find a connection between them?

Dan: I ran my own business and I am mostly a self-taught as an artist. When I met Alan Chan in Palo Alto, he helped me learn the skills I needed to bring my artistic visions to life. Art helps me express myself both creatively and in ways that are otherwise difficult (due to my introverted nature). As an engineer I love the idea of making something out of nothing and problem solving - painting works for both. The transition from engineering to art was much easier than one might think. Painting and writing code are both a very creative process. Being an introvert and a creative is what attracted me to engineering and I believe the same is true for art. When I saw the opportunity for me to leave the software business, I jumped at the chance because I knew I could finally pursue another creative field and something I had been drawn to my whole life - art.

SC: Would you tell me more about your attraction to abstract painting?

DL: When I was first learning and experimenting with painting, I worked smaller and with more detail. But, painting abstract paintings has always been my goal. That is the type of artwork I am drawn to. I like art that has a lot of movement and spontaneity.

I mainly paint because I love to do it so much. I am also now starting to get awards, sales, and noticed (as an artist), so that motivates me - mainly because I love the idea of other people enjoying my art. I want people to look at my art and feel they want to keep looking because it is so full of life. I want them to feel the passion I feel when I paint.

SC: How do you get started on a painting?

DL: I usually get a sudden and obvious feeling that I have to paint. I rarely know what I am going to paint, but I might have a very rough idea in mind. When the urge to paint hits me, I disappear into my studio and go nuts. It's an amazing escape into a very creative headspace. I know some people have to find ways to recharge their creativity and artistic drive. Luckily, I am not finding that a challenge!

SC: I am curious about how being an introvert works within the community of artists and studios at Arc.

DL: They are a very creative group. It's hard not to get inspired by the amazing artwork, events, and people. I love the fact that Arc attracts artist and art lovers through its many open studio events and shows. I've started taking artist workshops there and I feel lucky to have access to them.
